Inside 'Elephant Man'

Bas Bleu production focuses on the man behind the face

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Instead of showing the horrible disfigurement of John Merrick, more commonly known as the "Elephant Man," Cathy Reinking left the stage makeup and the drama behind.

"Once exposed on stage, he won't be deformed," said Reinking, who is directing Bas Bleu's new play "The Elephant Man." "We're trying to reflect his inner soul instead of projections of what he looked like, which was pretty hideous. I've seen it the other way already. I want to reflect his inner life - he was such a beautiful person."

The play tells the story of Merrick's rise from obscurity and ridicule to fame and respect after being taken in by famed Dr. Frederick Treves. Merrick's severe deformity, believed to have been caused by Proteus Syndrome or

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"Elephant Man's Disease," which causes abnormal, unchecked growth of bones and skin, made him legendary, but the play focuses on his kind nature and rise beyond his appearance.

"It deals with issues of appearances but also of charity and goodness," Reinking said, adding Merrick became almost a celebrity among aristocrats enabling him to cross class lines, something unheard of at the time.

In addition to simple makeup, the production will use a setting, Reinking said. "I wanted to emphasize the actors and not have them be overwhelmed by stage craft," she noted.

Reinking doesn't want audiences over thinking the play.

"It's a very emotional piece, not intellectual," she said. "I hope that they will be moved."

To add to the experience, cellist Sarah Studebaker will play during performances.

Reinking, former casting manager for NBC, said she had no problem mining Fort Collins' acting talent for a small but powerful cast.

"Stetson Weddle (who plays Merrick) is a brilliant actor," Reinking noted. "I like his simplicity."

The move from working with television to the stage was a welcome change, added Reinking, who worked on shows including "Frasier" and "Arrested Development."

"I always liked actors; I like to be around them," Reinking said, calling her work in theater more artistically stimulating. "It enriches my life more."

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
